



# 4/5/6 with Miss Scadding

Welcome back to term 4! Does anyone know where the holidays have gone? It was a lovely break, but 4/5/6 have settled straight back into their routines and I have confidence this is going to be their best and most enjoyable term yet! We have started our topics and the students are excited for all of the experiences to begin!

During English this term, we will be focusing on creating a persuasive text. We will look at different language features and how we can include those into our writing to convince our audiences to believe our arguments. Watch out parents, your kids might have some good reasons NOT to clean their room. I apologise in advance!

But, in mathematics, we are measuring using length and also expanding into calculating the perimeter and area on more complex shapes. Maybe a reason to clean their room, is so that the kids can measure their rooms? The hard work 4/5/6 have put in through the year with their number work has absolutely paid off and made mathematics quite fun! The students are feeling much more confident and showing a greater depth of independence. I am very proud!

Our history/geography topic this term has already opened the eyes of our little cherubs. We are studying "The World and its Diversity." The students have been already been exposed to indigenous cultures around the world, made connections and found similarities to our own indigenous culture. The traditional dress, dance, food and geographical locations of some of these cultures have really intrigued the kids. Please ask them to explain to you at home.



Our local wildlife gurus have already begun to thrive in this subject and I'm really looking forward to watching the student's curiosity and creativity grow as they explore this unit. At the end of the unit, students will be using technology and the content they have learnt throughout this topic to create their own animal to survive in a environment they have created.

# 3-6 with Mrs Oyston

Welcome back to Term 4! I hope everyone enjoyed their break.

This term in 3-6 students will be reading various picture books and looking at the author's purpose. Last week we started with one of my favourites, 'Are we there yet?' by Alison Lester. This is a story about a family who travel around Australia, and as you can imagine, the young child in the family is always asking, "are we there yet?" The students enjoyed looking at the various landmarks and natural features mentioned within the book.



In Science we will be looking at the Earth's Changing Surface. In this unit students investigate how and why natural processes and human actions change the Earth's surface over time. We will also intertwine studying about dinosaurs by exploring fossils.

Visual Arts sees students studying various famous artists from around the world. Last week we looked Vincent Van Gogh and his beautiful paintings, 'Starry Night' and 'Sunflowers', creating our own version of the later.



3-6 are also privileged to get to venture to Mr Ball's art room for more art. Here they get to try different mediums but mostly enjoy using the wood-burning tool. They have created some great art pieces over the time and now are working on beautiful wooden bowls.

Friday's cooking should be continuing, with last week Raiden and Tyson making their own 'Rocky Road'. Mrs Clenton provided a plethora of assorted goodies to add to their chocolate creations, with delicious results.

#### HSIE


This week we are wrapping up the exploration of 'Polynesian Expansion'.

The 'Island Nation' Assessment task should have been submitted last week. There are still students who have not attempted/submitted.


#### PDHPE


